President's Letter

I'd like to thank all of you that renewed your TLPOA memberships for 2020. With the suspension of requesting contributions to the EWM (Eurasian Water Milfoil) fund in 2020, there has been an increase in the number of folks choosing to become Lake Stewards. These additional dollars go into our General Fund and cover all our expenses except those for the Aeration and EWM Treatment Programs.

Any and all contributions are greatly appreciated.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Ice thickness is more variable this year from as little as a few inches to more than ten inches. Temperatures in Northern Michigan have been above freezing many times which can create an unstable condition. On East Twin, a snowmobiler did break through the ice on New Year's Eve. He had to be rescued by the U.S. Coast Guard and luckily is o.k. Please use sound judgement and plan accordingly to avoid an accident such as the one that brought in the new year.

Here's a brief overview of items worth noting:

The TLPOA Executive Board approved the 2020 budget at the January conference call. We increased the line item titled “lake monitoring” to \$7,500 and are including “water clarity” in its title. This was done in anticipation of efforts to combat the declining water clarity on East Twin.

The State of Michigan has not funded the CLMP lake monitoring program for 2020, meaning the water testing we perform for Secchi disk, chlorophyll, and phosphorus levels will not be analyzed unless we send the samples to a separate testing agency and foot the bill. Not sure yet how this is going to turn out. The good news is our state did fund the CLMP program for five years starting in 2021.

Karen Wilding and I met with the Township and County Health Department in December to discuss concerns failing septic systems may be having on our lakes. As such, Tim Brown, from the County Health Department is seeking to get grant monies expanded so we can implement a more comprehensive testing program for E-Coli. Currently, there is only one monthly test for E-Coli performed at the public beach on East Twin.

IMPORTANT NOTE: TLPOA DONATION ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

SHOCKING! WAS IT AN ALIEN SPACECRAFT OR A BOATLOAD OF RECALCITRANTS POACHING?

Short answer, Neither! The photo below depicts nighttime electrofishing, a technique used by the DNR to survey and evaluate the success of a fish stocking program. The boat used by the DNR on our Twin Lakes has far more lights than the pic below. To the uninformed, it can raise a big question: WHAT THE HECK IS THAT!

Neal Godby, Senior Fisheries Biologist for the DNR conducted such a survey to check up on the 77,216 spring fingerling walleye stocked on East Twin on June 21, 2019. The average length of the fingerling was 1.3 inches at the time of stocking. The effort consisted of surveying 4.0 miles of shoreline over a two-plus hour period. They captured a total of 237 walleye sizes 4-24 inches in length, of which 219 were age-0, meaning 219 were of the fingerling group released in June.

According to Neal, this was an excellent catch rate and indicated a healthy survival rate. The Management Direction at DNR is to continue alternate-year stocking between our two lakes. LOOK OUT WEST TWIN!

Walleye are a member of the perch family (Percidae). The **walleye** is named for its pearlescent eye, which is caused by a reflective layer of pigment called the tapetum lucidum, that helps them see and feed at night or in murky water. **Walleye** can reach a maximum length of about 36" and weigh over 20 pounds.

FROM YOUR TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR

As we continue to make Lewiston and all of Albert Township a safer, more attractive place to live and visit one issue that has been a concern to the Albert Township Board is that of dumpsters on private property. The concerns are the locations and visibility of dumpsters, and the maintenance of dumpsters, including refuse overflow. Dumpsters that can be viewed from any public or private road need to be either moved or shielded by an opaque fence or an effective vegetation screen. Property owners must keep dumpster lids closed and not allow refuse to accumulate above the top rim of the dumpster or allow refuse to accumulate on the ground near the dumpster. The section of the Nuisance Ordinance that covers dumpster location and shielding enforcement will be extended to May 25, 2020. Copies of Nuisance Ordinance No. 51 can be picked up at the Township Office at 4360 Hanson Ave. Lewiston. (Around the corner from the State Police Station)

Residents and visitors will continue to have the option of using the Township Transfer Site located at 3661 County Road 491 to drop off household refuse, or contract for weekly pickup service privately. The Montmorency Solid Waste Landfill located off County Road 487 south of Atlanta is another option.

On another matter, on March 10, voting will take place to renew the 0.5 Albert Township Road millage. The 0.5 mill brings in about \$77,000 a year that is used for local road brining and special road projects. If you are eligible to vote, please do so.

Coming up in town this spring is the Mushroom Festival on May 9 and the Block Party on June 11.

MICHIGAN'S AGING SEPTIC SYSTEMS

The major bacterial pollutant in Michigan's water is E.coli. While E.coli levels are affected by several factors such as water fowl, a failed septic system around a body of water can be a major source. Unfortunately, Michigan is the only state that does not require regular inspection of septic systems. Yes, our "Great Lake State" has no legal requirements and the problem is not getting better.

Only eleven out of Michigan's 83 counties currently have established septic codes which are administered by county health departments. Most of these codes include inspections only at the point of sale. While point of sale ordinances are better than nothing, they aren't strong enough to protect our drinking water, ground water, or the lakes and rivers we so admire.

How old is your septic system? Do you know the last time your septic system was inspected, or at a minimum pumped out?

The TLPOA Board is pursuing an expanded E. coli testing program and is partnering with Albert Township and the County Health Department to determine the next steps to be taken.



GOOD AND BAD E. COLI

There are good and bad E.coli. The good kind inhabits the intestines of most warm-blooded animals, aiding in digestion. Bad E.coli will cause diarrhea, stomach cramps and vomiting and can lead to other health issues, especially in young and elderly.

Current testing for E.coli is limited to the public beach on East Twin during the summer months.

THE AMERICAN BALD EAGLE – A MAJESTIC WORK OF ART THAT WAS ALMOST LOST

This past November, just as the lakes began to freeze over, a group of as many as seven bald eagles were spotted on both East and West Twin on the freshly frozen lakes.



Bald Eagles were declared the American national bird in 1782, but their numbers steadily declined over the next two centuries owing to human activities. For example, Alaskan bounty hunters killed more than 100,000 eagles in the period 1917-52.

The U.S. Government made it illegal to kill bald eagles in 1940 (Alaska was exempt).

Numbers continued to decline, thanks in part to the usage of DDT pesticide until by the early 1960's, there were less than 450 nesting pairs in the U.S.

Finally, in 1972, the use of DDT was banned in the U.S., and in 1978, the government declared the bald eagle an endangered species.

By the late 80's, these measures helped replenish the numbers of nesting pairs, and the bald eagle was re-classified from endangered to threatened status in 1995. Current estimates today are that there are more than 7,000 nesting pairs in the U.S.

Around here, it's fairly common to spot a bald eagle. The eagle nest located on the south-east shore of East Twin has been active for several years now, although unfortunately, no young were born in this location in 2019.

EVER THINK ABOUT BEING A VOLUNTEER?

The TLPOA Board of Directors always needs help. Our current Board is short several members.
